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Deepening Our Discipleship

When you pray, do you ever wonder if you are "doing it right"? Here's a little secret – we all do sometimes. In fact, even Jesus' disciples asked him how they should pray. They didn't ask because they didn't know the Psalms to pray. They had them memorized. They didn't ask because they had never prayed before. They were faithful, devout Jews who knew all of the ritual prayers. They asked because they saw that when Jesus drew away to pray, there was a change in him. They asked because they saw that prayer for Jesus was about relationship with God and they longed for the same.

How are we to seek God in prayer? The Lord's Prayer comes from Jesus' answer to his disciples. He offered it as a pattern for how we are to approach God. Sometimes, we might pray the whole prayer. Other times, we might pause and just think about one phrase and how it applies to us and our lives. There is no one right way to pray, all that is required is a heart that is seeking God.

Jesus taught that we are first to acknowledge who God is: *our* loving, heavenly parent who deserves our praise.

We are to pray for God's Will to be done here on earth now, just as it is already done in heaven – through us and *our* actions.

We are instructed to ask for what we need *today* to accomplish God's Will; give us this day *enough*.

We petition God to restore our relationship with God, forgiving our failures *in* the same way that we are restoring our relationship with people who have failed us.

We remember Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness as he was tempted in every way that we are tempted, and we pray that God's Spirit will not lead us into the temptations of the wilderness, but *deliver us* from all of the temper's offers:

1. The tempter offers kingdoms, "Look at all the authority and riches in the world, this is my domain, my kingdom, and it can all be yours in exchange for your worship." And Jesus answers, "Our devotion is to God. God not only comes first; we worship and serve no one and nothing else."






Save the Date

SESSION REPORT

Session received the final Stewardship report and adopted a 2023 Budget. The January 2023 Financial Report was accepted. "Thus the heavens and the earth were completed in all their vast array. By the seventh day God had finished the work he had been doing; so on the seventh day he rested from all his work. And God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work of creating that he had done." -Genesis 2:1-3



What is a sabbatical?

The word sabbatical has its roots in the biblical concept of Sabbath ("to rest" or "to cease"). Sabbath keeping is setting aside time that God consecrates and makes holy. Sabbatical leave is a time for our pastor to shift gears in order to rest, disengage, study, and reflect in order to return to minister among us refreshed and renewed in body, mind, and spirit.

Sabbatical is more than a vacation from meetings, budgets, sermons, and people in need. It is a time for Rev. Luter to receive spiritual nourishment and a change in perspective, to deepen her relationship with God - a season of spiritual growth.

Sabbatical is also a special season of growth for the entire congregation. "We tell our churches and our pastors that the sabbatical is good for so many reasons, including that it teaches both the pastor and the congregation that the congregation can survive without the pastor," said the Rev. Dr. Jan Edmiston, the general presbyter for the Presbytery of Charlotte, where sabbaticals are required in the terms of call for any installed pastor.



Do other clergy go on sabbatical?

Yes, the Office of the General Assembly recommends 3 months of sabbatical for all full-time pastors serving churches who have served in their current position for six continuous years. Since 2017, the Presbytery of the Mid-South has required a 3-month Sabbatical Leave for every 7 years of service in the minimum Terms of Call when a congregation calls a pastor.

How long will Rev. Luter be gone?

After serving as our pastor for 9 years, Rev. Luter will be gone for a little over three months. We will have a formal send-off event for her on Sunday, May 21, 2023 with a fellowship event following worship. Rebecca's last day in the office will be Thursday, May 26, 2023. She will return to the office on Tuesday, September 5, 2023. Her first Sunday back will be September 10, 2023.



What will Rev. Luter be doing on her sabbatical?

Rebecca is currently enrolled in the Doctor of Ministry program at Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Georgia. She will be engaged in two projects related to her degree program during her sabbatical, one related to leading hybrid worship (worship that is both in-person and online) and the other related to the theology of the Lord's Supper.



Who will preach and lead worship?

Tom Sauer will serve as the temporary pastor during Rev. Luter's sabbatical leave and in that role will preach and lead worship. Tom, a lifelong Presbyterian, has always felt a call to the ministry. He completed his studies in the Commissioned Lay Pastor program at the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary in 2010 and began leading worship at LaGrange Presbyterian Church. In May 2011, he was commissioned as a lay pastor in the Presbyterian Church by the Presbytery of the Mid-South and continued to lead worship in LaGrange until November 2019. In April 2013, Tom joined the staff of Germantown Presbyterian Church as minister to senior adults and continues to serve in this role.



Who will cover Rev. Luter's responsibilities during her absence?

Tom will be available to contact if you have prayer requests or experience a family or personal crisis. He will be working approximately 20 hours per week. The mission and ministry of Farmington will continue to be led by the members of Session.



Will the FPC operating budget need to be increased as a result of the sabbatical?

No, the cost of the sabbatical will be paid for from funds earmarked for this purpose.



Will the church just be in a "holding pattern" while Rev. Luter is away?

No, we are confident that all of our ministries will continue to flourish while Rebecca is away. It is important to remember that the sabbatical is a two-way process: while Rebecca is on her journey of renewal, refreshment, and study, we will embark on a journey as well – to grow in our love for each other and for Christ as we take primary lead for guiding and providing the ministries of Farmington. Congregations have long experienced the joy of growth as a community during times of pastoral vacancy. As we lean on one another, we will learn new ways that we can be involved in making Farmington a home for God's people and how we can engage in having a heart for God's world. Our great joy is that at the end of 3 months, Rebecca will be back as our Pastor.



Will Rebecca be in contact with Farmington during the sabbatical?

No, an important part of a sabbatical is to make a complete break from things. Rebecca will be taking a break from all contact. She will not be checking email or on social media. She has given guidance to Tom and Session about special circumstances in which she is to be notified.



How will we welcome Rebecca back when she returns?

The worship service on September 10, 2023 will be followed by a special "welcome home" reception for Rebecca with food and opportunities for sharing.



How can I learn more about the sabbatical?

WOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

Pat Sherman Recognized by the City for 20+ Years of Joyful Service

Former Commissioner Pat Sherman approaches volunteer work from a place of pure delight. "In my time, I've served on five different commissions. I am joyfully motivated by the great pleasure of serving our city," she said. "When I go shopping or go to appointments, I look around with merriment and think, 'Oh yeah, this is what we did on the Design Review Commission and this looks good!' Or when I drive by a house I recognize, I think, 'Oh, that's the house we approved for the height of a fence while on the Board of Zoning Appeals.'

"It motivates and pleases me when I see the accomplishments and improvements made while serving on each commission."

At the City's Commission Celebration in October last year, Sherman was one of four commissioners who were recognized for serving for more than 20 years.

"I initially chose the Planning and Personnel Advisory commissions because my husband had recently passed away and I wanted to stay as busy as possible," Sherman said. "I requested to take his Design Review Commission position for his term and also be on the Personnel Commission. I've made personnel decisions and written policies in my business, so I thought this could be a good fit."

Sherman is a graduate of San Jose State University, where she earned her Master's in Nursing. Over the course of 21 years, she's worked at Unity Hospice, Unity Healthcare, Southern Healthcare Solutions and as a partner in Hospice of Hope.

"All my life, I've wanted to teach, help others and serve the Lord," said Sherman, an ordained elder at Farmington Presbyterian Church. "Do I do this well? Probably not, but I try hard to accomplish this and often feel that I have."

A native Memphian, Sherman met and married her late husband, Neil, in Memphis. While Neil served in the Navy, they lived all over the country until he retired in 1990 and they returned to the Mid-South, where Neil earned his Master of Divinity. "He and I volunteered together in any way we could," Sherman said.

Now, Sherman volunteers on various company boards and is a member of the Germantown Rotary Club.

"Germantown is a great place to live. I'm very comfortable living here and, most of all, I feel safe," she said. "In addition to safety, I am proud of this city for being awarded the Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award. It's a challenging award to attain and it says something significant about our city."

As far as volunteering goes, Sherman doesn't plan on stopping anytime soon.

"I will always volunteer and serve the community and my church in any way possible," she said. "The culmination of my life and experiences has brought me to this place I am today, and I gladly continue to share my hardearned wisdom with the city I call home."
